Course Description

This course is intended to teach laparoscopic and open techniques for ventral, inguinal, and hiatal hernia repair, to discuss the different prosthetic materials available, their application and association with the healing process, and to describe the techniques used for minimally invasive access in the multiply-operated abdomen.

Educational Objectives

Upon completion of this course participants will be able to:

1. Identify the techniques of laparoscopic surgery for ventral, inguinal, and hiatal hernia repair.
2. Recognize the different prosthetic materials, and their appropriate applications in hernia repair.
3. Identify techniques for access to the multiple reoperated abdomen.
4. Explain the anatomy and indications of laparoscopic inguinal hernia repair.
5. Interpret the literature of open and laparoscopic hernia repair.
